The SU is a democratic organisation which changes every year. We are led by our members, who guide everything from our bars through to the elected representatives that sit on our Trustee Board (this being the panel that looks after the charity from a financial and legal perspective).

Among the candidates featured in this booklet are the students who will lead the SU next year both as full and part-time officers. In their roles they will help to determine what kind of events, campaigns, opportunities and initiatives will be available to you and your friends during your time at UEA.

The SU exists to make your student experience unforgettable by providing the space and opportunities for you to grow both individually and professionally in your time here – while having fun in the process! If you have an opinion on the SU or on your university experience so far, your vote is the best tool you have to take those views and actually get something done about it.



Voting is simple and you can even do it from your phone!

Here at the SU we use a voting method called Single Transferable Voting. This means that when you vote in SU elections, you'll be asked to write a number beside each candidate, ranking them by order of preference with "1" being your first choice. You don't have to number all of the candidates, but doing so means that even if your first choice doesn't get elected, you'll still have had a say in the person who does. This system gives voters more choice and more decision-making power, prevents more votes from being 'wasted' and makes it easier to determine a winner.

re-open nominations

All elections have Re-Open Nominations listed as a candidate. If you don't like any of the candidates, you can select this option - or you can rank it behind choices you do like, creating a vote which essentially means 'I like Candidate A and Candidate B but would rather Re-Open Nominations than elect any of the other remaining candidates.' If enough people vote for Re-Open Nominations, then the entire process for that election starts again, and new candidates are able to nominate themselves to run for the position.

Liaise with the members of the relevant clubs, societies or peer support groups.

LGBTQ+ (open place)

Represent the interests of LGBTQ+ students and be their voice on the issues they face as LGBTQ+ students at university. Engage with the University and other relevant organisations to achieve improvements for LGBTQ+ students on the issues they face as LGBTQ+ students at university. Liaise with the members of relevant clubs, societies or peer support groups.

Students with Disabilities Officer (open place)

Be one of three officers that represents the interests of students with disabilities and be their voice on the issues they face as students with disabilities at university; engage with the University and other relevant organisations to achieve improvements for students with disabilities on the issues they face as students with disabilities at university. Liaise with the members of the relevant clubs, societies or peer support groups; and be an observer to the NUS Disabled Students Conference.

Black Students' Officer

Represent the interests of black students and be their voice on the issues they face as black students at university, engage with the University and other relevant organisations to achieve, improvements for black students on the issues they face as black students at university; liaise with the members of relevant clubs, societies, or peer support groups; and be the Union's delegate to the NUS Black Students' Conference.

Non-Portfolio

Fullfil all the duties as outlined in their manifesto, subject to SU policy and the strategic plan. Not undertake any duty that infringes upon or overlaps with the job descriptions of other officers of the Student Officer Committee. Four positions available - two of which are reserved for women and non-binary students.

NUS Delegate

NUS Delegate represents uea(su) at a national level at the National Union of Students (NUS) Conferences.

Women's Officer

Represent the interests of women students and be their voice on the issues they face as women studying at university. Engage with the University and other relevant organisations to achieve improvements for women studying at university on the issues they face at university. Liaise with the members of the relevant clubs, societies or peer support groups.

People of Colour (open place)

Represent the interests of BAME students and be their voice on the issues they face as BAME students at university. Engage with the University and other relevant organisations to achieve improvements for BAME students at university on the issues they face at university. Liaise with the members of the relevant clubs, societies or peer support groups.

• Continue lobbying for a better University Ethical Investment Policy and bring back the SU Ethical Spending Policy, making sure your tuition-fees are spent on a better future.

I'm disabled, queer, and Jewish; this means I have an insider view on issues of ability, sexuality and gender, and religion, but I also understand my limitations and privilege. I am committed to promoting a compassionate, fair, and liberatory culture on campus; fighting climate change; and decolonising the university. Our diversity is our strength, and true participation for all is the key to success.

I have volunteered for committee positions consistently throughout my university experience – I can't seem to stay away from student democracy.

During my undergraduate degree at Oxford, I was on the **founding committee of Class Act, a campaign supporting students from working class, low income, first generation, and state comprehensive school backgrounds**, as well as care leavers and estranged students.

I care about peoples' material conditions and how it affects their university experience. Everyone has their own unique situations and can use help sometimes, and this is something I'm going to carry forward into this role if I'm elected.

I've also been involved in political actions both at UEA and elsewhere. At undergrad, I supported a Bangladeshi Muslim friend in his pro-human rights campaigns and I seconded a motion in support of Rohingya Muslims in Myanmar. I am also a pro-Palestine activist.

I'm the **invisible disabilities officer for UEA Labour**, a role I take pride in as a neurodivergent person with several mental health and neurological conditions.

My proudest project at UEA has been my involvement with **Decolonise UEA and the UEA Divestment Coalition.** Both have involved building connections, facilitating space for oppressed people in the university, and taking part in protest campaigns.

Pledges

- Safeguard postgraduate and mature student spaces on campus. This includes social spaces such as the bar, and working spaces like offices – while also finding space for commuters and a nap nook/quiet room.
- Accessible and well-publicised financial guidance. Students should know all about what
 the university can offer but also offering advice on non-university forms of assistance.
 End the stigma, make it more visible, make it easier to apply.
- Support for the University and Colleges Union. Many of us are University staff, and we're all affected by working conditions. I will work with PGRs, PGTs, and the UG officer to find how we can all stand together and make things as positive and co-ordinated as they can be. Together we are powerful.
- **Decolonise, decarbonise, and divest**. I will work to decolonise our university and make our financial investments more ethical.

I also want to work with the different accommodation services on campus to help international students with their accommodations prior to their arrival as I had many of my PG colleagues who struggled with housing when they came to do their postgraduate course.

2. Work on increasing the work opportunities offered to the PHD students (4th year specifically) and their funding.

Many of my PG colleagues have raised the topic of 4th year PHD funding issues with me over the years, explaining why I'd be making it a must for me to fight om increasing the number of seminars and workshop opportunities offered to them. This is because many of them rely heavily on those opportunities for their living cost. I'll also communicate with the university to improve PHD's funding in their 4th year.

3. Maintaining PG weekly sports socials and increase the number of PG Socials.

As your PG officer I'll make sure to keep organizing the weekly sports social which has been organized by the previous PG officers over the years, and I'm also going to work on increasing the number of socials for PG students (e.g. trips during holidays) as I believe that it is a great way to deal with university pressure and provide a sense of escapism.

Katerina Shaw - #KatsGotYourBack

Hi everyone! I'm Katerina, a postgraduate Environmental Sciences student and former undergraduate Ecology student.

The postgraduate experience is undoubtedly unique. Whilst we all deal with issues ranging from educational to financial, psychological and social, postgraduate students deal with distinct difficulties that further complicate these.

Education is especially important to postgraduate students and must always be delivered to the highest standard. Whether in postgraduate research labs or MSc lectures, I want to know where there are shortcomings and focus action on these areas. This would be done through surveys and direct communication with students.

Socialising is also just as important to PG students as their UG counterparts, yet I know it can be harder for postgraduate research students to feel fully integrated into life at UEA. I will therefore make a concerted effort to create opportunities for PGR students to meet each other, while also encouraging you to join clubs and societies that interest you, as all are welcome.

I'm aware that mature students and commuting students often face scheduling issues, as there are other factors in your life affecting whether or not you can attend events on campus. I'd take it upon myself to resolve problems with academic timetables as far as possible, and PG social events will be organised around when most postgraduate students are already on campus, minimising the number of you that would be unable to come due to travelling or other commitments.

If elected, I'll help maintain the strong postgraduate community cultivated by Ayane over the past two years, including: trips to the city and surrounding area; coffee and cake events; pizza parties; and evening socials for those of you wanting to take part in the Norwich nightlife. There'll be something for everyone!

Something I feel very strongly about is inclusion, and I want people from all ethnicities, cultures, sexualities and genders to feel welcomed into our community. I'd therefore want to hear from you regarding other PG events you'd like me to start, or if you felt that something was preventing you from feeling included.

Speaking of inclusion, when coming to UEA, international postgraduate students experience a new city, country, language and culture – potentially for the first time – with language being a key way in which people feel a sense of belonging. I'm a third-year Politics and Economics student, have been a course rep every year and this year I've been ECO School Convenor. I will be a fearless advocate for you on whatever is important to YOU. The SU officers work for YOU and so our priorities should be what yours are. With me as your officer, they will be.

Here's what I want to do for you:

1. Lobby the university to reinvest resources back into the hub so EVERYONE is better supported

The university has cut resources in the hub and been unclear on the role the Student Information Zone plays. This has meant delays with getting extenuating circumstances, module changes and of course timetables. This puts unnecessary stress on all of us and it must be better. I want to work with the university to improve this VITAL system that we all rely on.

2. Change university-wide group work policies to make sure your final degree is based on YOUR work, not others by introducing a module weighting cap

I know all too well that group work can be incredibly stressful and while it's an important part, module grades shouldn't be solely based on group work. I'll work to introduce a cap on the weighting that group work can have within modules – something we've already done in ECO.

3. Work to ensure the University and Schools are clear on what blended learning means to everyone and then listen to and adopt YOUR feedback

Blended learning is here to stay so we need to make sure it's working in our best interests. As your officer, I'll work with the university to make sure module structures are communicated BEFORE the choice is made so you know whether you're signing up for online or in-person lectures. I'll also improve our Course Reps and Convenors systems to make YOUR VOICES heard, not just mine.

4. Continue to improve accessibility for trans and all LGBT+ students

As a trans person, I know just how important the visibility of correct pronouns is. More can be done on this, including pronoun visibility on live lectures in Blackboard, as well as encouraging everyone to have pronouns on their email signatures to destigmatize those for whom it is so important. I will work on all of these things and more if elected as your officer

5. Transparency starts with the SU and your officers so we need to start setting the example

Officers and our SU do some great work but a lot of the time, it's not clear to students what this work is. As your officer, I will be open and honest about all the work I am doing for you and ensure that the wider SU is doing the same.

Hello there!

My name is Ivo Garnham and I'm running to be re-elected as your Undergraduate Education Officer! I started this role last summer and would love to continue fighting for improvements to education at UEA for a second year. Coming back to campus has been a challenge for us all, but I have seized every opportunity and established relationships with all the key university figures, meaning I'm in a better position than anyone to bring about the changes we need and deserve.

My policies:

Effective blended learning:

Since UEA moved to "Blended Learning" – moving some taught content online – I've been pushing for as much in-person teaching as possible. I'm proud to say this has been a success, with almost 80% of teaching last semester taking place on campus. However, this was not consistent across all courses. I want to monitor how teaching is delivered in each school and for the university to commit to making that 80% a standard across all courses. I also want to continue ensuring lectures are recorded so you always have access to the content you're paying for.

• Welfare plans:

I will campaign for all schools to have full plans on how they intend to support their students. This includes things such as the sensitive content warnings I helped to implement and how students who have to self-isolate or miss classes for other reasons will be supported. This is particularly important for students with placements, such as on Medicine and Health Science courses and apprenticeships.

• More accessible reasonable adjustments:

This year I was part of a review of the current reasonable adjustments offered to students with disabilities or learning difficulties. The next step to take is to make it easier for students to understand what these adjustments are, whether they are eligible for them, and how to apply.

• Review of assessments

Last semester I successfully made sure that all possible assessments were open-book and online to ensure they were as inclusive as possible. Next year, I will conduct a full review of assessment types, including what best judges students' knowledge, what is most accessible to students, and what is most useful for future employment. Yes – this will include tearing the very concept of group projects to absolute shreds.

On top of all that, I promise to continue to fight for the things you care about. I will always be approachable, friendly, and will take your concerns seriously. I've made a promising start campaigning on behalf of students this year, from the timetabling review, to getting UEA to commit to reviewing the extenuating circumstances process, to ensuring that a wellbeing quiet space is created. I have always and will always ensure that everybody's voice is heard and that everybody is treated fairly. It has been the pleasure of a lifetime to serve you this year; I hope you'll allow me to continue with the essential work I so genuinely and completely love doing.

Improving the counselling services on campus

It can be difficult to access mental health support on campus. Sometimes, even if you know where to go, it can be an emotionally draining process regardless. The single session counselling currently provided by UEA is not enough for everyone. I want to support students by offering more individualised mental health support rather than a one-size-fits-all approach.

I will improve mental health services on campus by:

- · Lobbying for different types of counselling as opposed to exclusively offering single sessions
- · implementing follow up appointments for UEA's single session counselling
- signposting where to access help (on campus and with the Norfolk Wellbeing service)
- · improving the UEA wellbeing app and wellbeing related social media content.

Adjusting how students are granted exam extensions

Students have struggled to access exam extensions and extenuating circumstances due to lack of specified proof. Through these difficult times, I think it is important for students to feel especially supported by the university.

I will achieve this by:

- finding ways of reimplementing the 10 day extension.
- making extenuating circumstances easier to access, especially for students going through health issues and bereavements.

Increasing student safety when travelling to and from UEA

With Bowthorpe being a prominent affordable student area in Norwich, the lack of bus services between there and campus is unacceptable. Currently there are no other options past 8pm other than walking in dark and secluded areas to get home. This is inaccessible and unfair, especially for disabled students as well as those who need to access university resources.

I will bring this issue forward by lobbying for buses to/from Bowthorpe so that all students have easy access to campus.

Skills that make me well suited for Wellbeing and Diversity officer:

I have experience advocating for young people working with the Young Carers charity and Allsorts LGBT charity who both help young people access counselling and other wellbeing resources in a safe community.

If elected my action plan is:

Student wellbeing

Problem: As of 2021, the university employs 45 people to provide support for students' mental health wellbeing. For a population of around 17,161 students, this is simply not enough!

Solution: The university should revaluate the funding for mental health and counselling as this will support student life and will have a direct impact on students physical and mental wellbeing as well as academic achievement. Introducing termly mental health weeks focussing on self-care

Problem: Students feel unsafe on campus. Between 2016-2020, 113 transphobic hate crimes were reported in Norfolk.

Solution: I would like to work alongside Norwich clubs and charities to ensure that all students feel safe on nights out. One way to do this would be to have the return of 'Reclaim the Night' a campaign for better and safer streets and to raise awareness of sexual harassment. The university should also be open about reporting spiking and other incidents that occur during club nights. Continue the work of the current Welfare officer in representing and supporting the LGBTQ community and being an ally against racism.

A place for everyone

Problem: There are issues relating to inclusivity and accessibility at our university.

Solution: Students should not be excluded from opportunities and should feel part of a community. Introducing strobe-free nights making the LCR more autism and epilepsy friendly.

Problem: Over 30% of student bodies commute to campus, of which most feel there is no space for them to relax.

Solution: Providing a designated lounge for student commuters. A social space to meet others in a similar situation, a place to have lunch, do work, and fill the gap between lectures. UEA should acknowledge students that commute and improve the parking assignment system.

A university that is ours:

Our university is proud to have such a diverse community of students. However, this is not reflected in the university environment. Students should be able to see their artwork around campus, have the chance to perform their music and have access to food that represents the diversity them.

Why vote for me?

I have dedicated a substantial amount of my own time researching students' issues with the university, I would like to bring these issues to light. While the current Welfare officer has achieved a lot, there is still lots to be done and this is only a brief overview of what I would like to change.
